### TIPS

1. Plant in groups. Several of one species en mass is more effective.
2. Include a range of bloom times, spring to fall to ensure a consistent supply or nectar.
3. Include plants for caterpillars. Host plants are intended for the caterpillars to eat. Tolerate some holes and most important...
4. NEVER USE PESTICIDES.
5. Provide a basking spot such as a rock in full sun.
6. Provide drinking spots. Butterflies cannot drink from open water. Mud puddles, wet sand or sponges can all provide a place to drink. Include perches such as pebbles and sticks.
7. Tolerate some untidiness and leave some preferred weeds.
